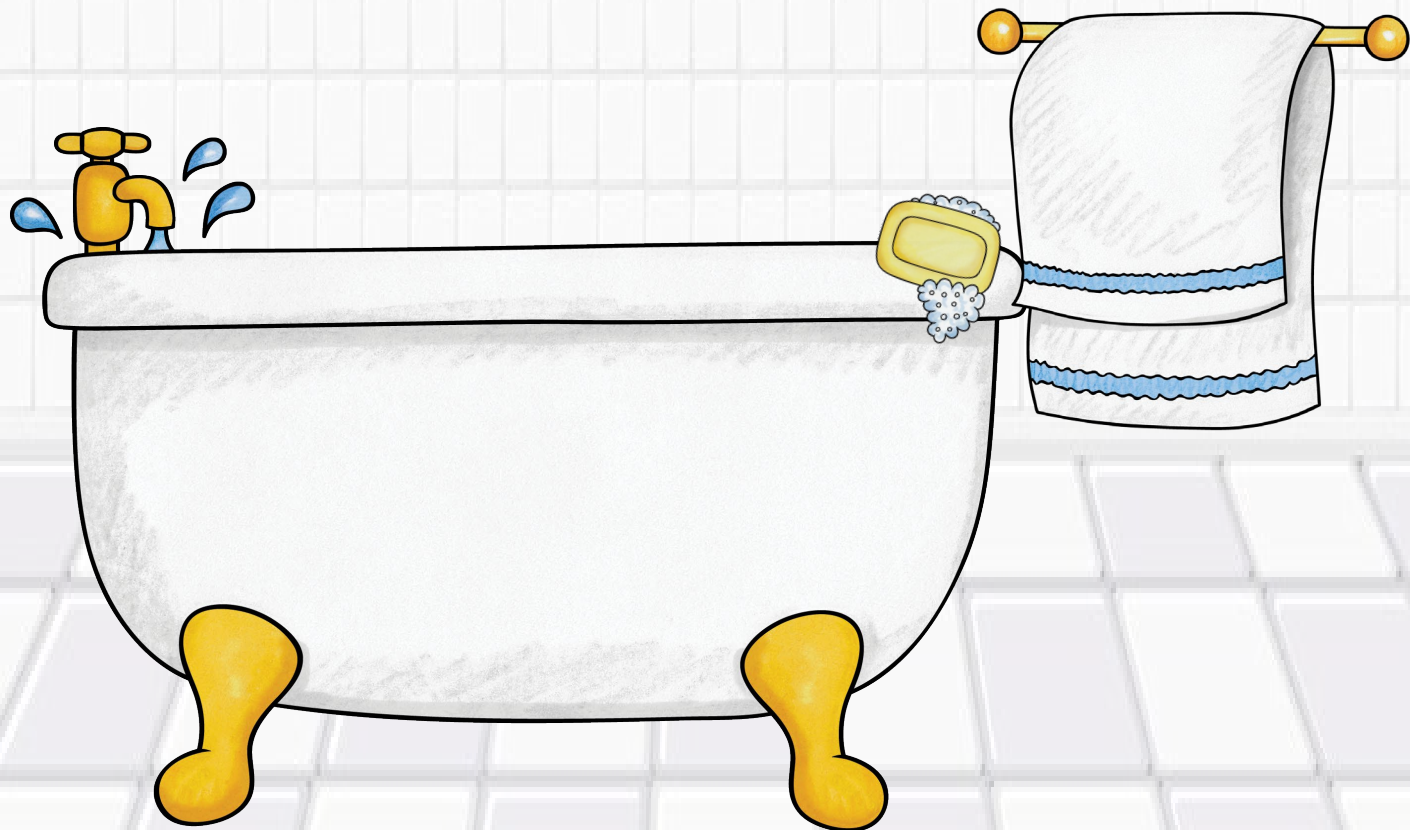

TASL Level 1

(single words and word combinations)

bathtub (noun)

water (noun)

hot water (adjective-noun)

Sit in the bathtub. (verb-noun)

Where are the bubbles? (interrogative)

bubbles (noun)

uh oh! (expression)

Drop the bubbles. (verb-noun)

Daddy opens the bubbles. (noun-verb)

Wash my hair. (verb-noun)

Mommy pours the water. (noun-verb)

all clean! (expression)

a dirty foot (adjective-noun)

Wash my foot. (verb-noun)

My foot is in the water. (noun-noun)

splash, splash! (expression)

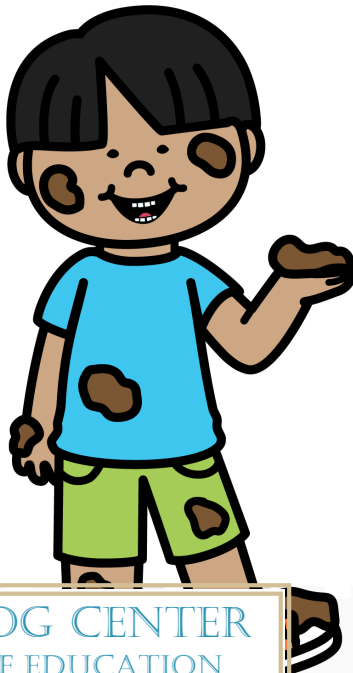
Water is on the floor. (noun-noun)

tummy (noun)

Wash my tummy. (verb-noun)

bye bubbles (expression)

TASL Level 2

(simple sentences of at least 3 words)

I will take a bath. (subject-verb-object)

Turn on the water. (interrogative)

The water is hot. (subject-verb-adjective)

Can I have bubbles? (interrogative)

Pour bubbles in the water. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

I got in the bathtub. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

My face is dirty. (subject-verb-adjective)

You can open the soap. (subject-verb-object)

I am washing my tummy. (subject-verb-object)

Water is on the floor. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

Don't splash the water! (subject-verb-object)

Shampoo is in my hair. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

Pour water on my head. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

I will close my eyes. (subject-verb-object)

Where is my duck? (interrogative)

Put it in the water. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

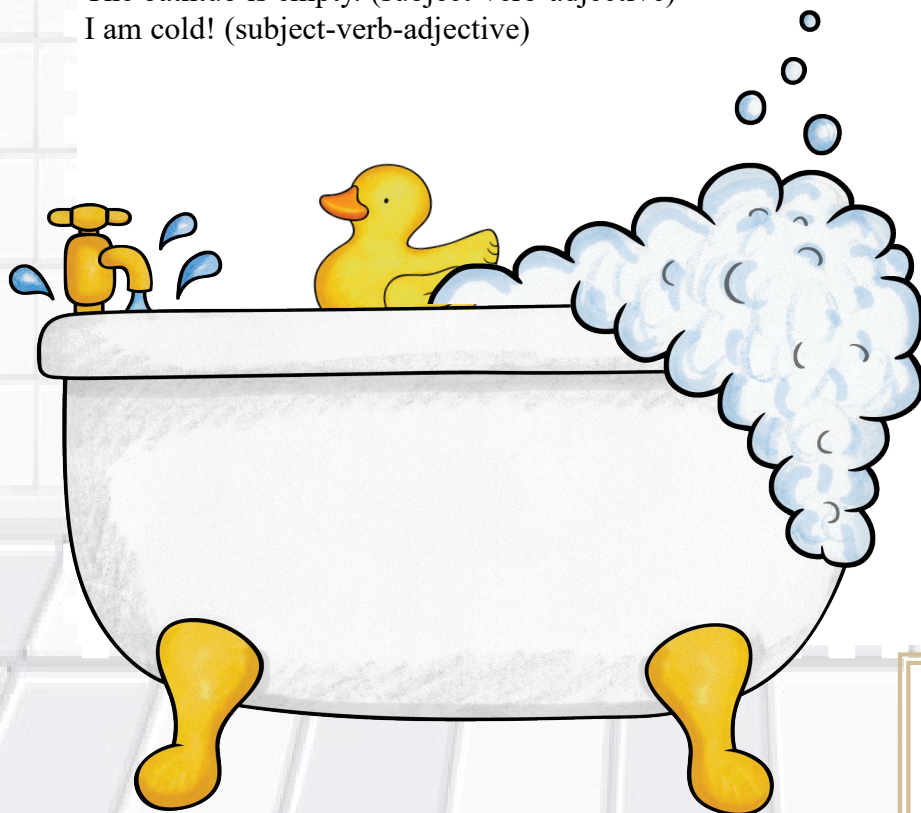
I am all clean. (subject-verb-adjective)

I need a towel. (subject-verb-object)

Can you help me? (interrogative)

The bathtub is empty. (subject-verb-adjective)

I am cold! (subject-verb-adjective)

TASL Level 3

(simple and complex sentences of at least 6 words)

It's time to take a bath. (one clause + an infinitive)

Can you turn on the water? (interrogative)

Mom said, "I'll open the bubbles." (direct discourse)

I poured bubbles in the water. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

I touched the bubble and it popped. (two clauses + a conjunction)

We have to open the shampoo. (one clause + an infinitive)

Wash my hair because it's dirty. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Pour the water on my head. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Will you get my yellow duck? (interrogative)

The duck is floating on the water. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

I'm pretending to be a fish. (one clause + an infinitive)

Mom said, "Don't splash the water." (direct discourse)

The floor is wet because you splashed. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I need to wash my arms. (one clause + an infinitive)

I am scrubbing with my washcloth. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

I am cleaning my dirty feet. (subject-verb-object)

Can I be done with my bath? (interrogative)

The water is going down the drain. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

I need a big, clean towel. (subject-verb-object)

I am dripping on the floor. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

I can't dry my back by myself. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Mom said, "You are all clean!" (direct discourse)

TASL Level 4

(complex sentences of at least 8 words containing 2 verb forms)

- I need a bath because I am dirty. (two clauses + a conjunction)
Who is going to turn on the water? (interrogative)
Mom said, "I will turn it on for you." (direct discourse)
I told her not to make it too hot. (indirect discourse)
I squeezed the bubbles while the water ran. (two clauses + a conjunction)
Mom said, "So many bubbles are in the tub!" (direct discourse)
Will you pour the water on my head? (interrogative)
I can't see because water is in my eyes. (two clauses + a conjunction)
He told me I need to wipe my eyes. (indirect discourse)
You said I could open the bottle of shampoo. (indirect discourse)
First, I'll wash and then I'll rinse. (two clause + a conjunction)
Will you help me get out the shampoo? (interrogative)
Now I am going to wash my arms. (one clause + an infinitive)
Dad said, "Don't forget to wash your elbows." (direct discourse)
After I wash my legs, I'll wash my feet. (two clauses + a conjunction)
I keep scrubbing but the dirt is stuck. (two clauses + a conjunction)
The dirt came off since you helped me. (two clauses + a conjunction)
I like to play with the bath toys. (one clause + an infinitive)
Dad said, "It is time to get out." (direct discourse)
Why can't I stay longer in the tub? (interrogative)
I'll dry off while you empty the tub. (two clauses + a conjunction)

TASL Level 5

(very complex sentences of at least 10 words containing 3 verb forms)

Mom told me I must take a bath because I'm dirty. (indirect discourse)

Will you turn on the water since I don't know how? (interrogative)

While I'm waiting, I'll get my towel and bring it into the bathroom. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Will you turn off the water, so the bathtub doesn't overflow? (interrogative)

I will be careful when I get in, so I don't slip. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Dad said, "We ran out of bubbles, so I need to buy more." (direct discourse)

I don't want to get in because the water is too hot. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

"If we add cold water, then it will cool down," Mom said. (direct discourse)

Adding cold water was a great idea because now the water feels good. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

I need to get my hair wet so I can use shampoo. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Mom told me to look up unless I want to get soap in my eyes. (indirect discourse)

You need to keep rinsing my hair until all the shampoo is out. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Since my hair is clean, I'll wash my legs and then wash my feet. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Can you help me wash my back since I can't reach it? (interrogative)

I have to stop splashing because water is on the floor. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

What will happen if we don't clean up the water? (interrogative)

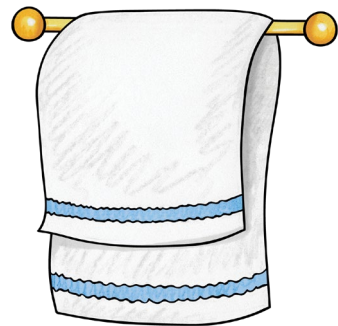
Dad told me that I might slip if we leave the water. (indirect discourse)

I want to wash my belly button after I wash my knees. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Even though you said I should get out, I want to stay in. (indirect discourse)

Will you help me dry off because it's hard to dry my legs? (interrogative)

Watching the water drain is fun because it looks like a tornado! (two clauses + a secondary verb)
