
Activity of the Month January 2025

(single words and word combinations)

All gone! (expression)

a cat (noun)

a <u>little bowl</u> (adjective-noun)

an empty bowl (adjective-noun)

Open.(verb)

Mommy opens. (noun-verb)

Mommy pours. (noun-verb)

The cat eats. (noun-verb)

two bowls (adjective-noun)

a blue bowl (adjective-noun)

Where is the water? (interrogative)

cold water (adjective-noun)

Pour the water. (verb-noun)

Water is in the bowl. (noun-noun)

<u>Uh oh!</u> (expression)

Water is on my shirt. (noun-noun)

Clean up the water. (verb-noun)

Where is the cat? (interrogative)

The <u>cat runs</u>. (noun-verb)

Sit down. (verb)

The cat drinks. (noun-verb)



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(simple sentences of at least 3 words)

The food is all gone! (subject-verb-object)

My dog is hungry. (subject-verb-adjective)

Where is the dog food? (interrogative)

Food is in the cabinet. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

Can you open the bag? (interrogative)

The bag is full. (subject-verb-adjective)

Pour it in the bowl. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

The dog is eating food. (subject-verb-object)

I see two bowls. (subject-verb-object)

The green bowl needs water. (subject-verb-noun)

We need more water. (subject-verb-object)

Can you get the water? (interrogative)

I can't reach the sink. (subject-verb-object)

Pour water in the bowl. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

You spilled the water. (subject-verb-object)

Water is on the floor. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

The floor is wet. (subject-verb-adjective)

I need a towel. (subject-verb-object)

I can wipe the floor. (subject-verb-object)

We need more water. (subject-verb-object)

My dog is drinking water. (subject-verb-object)

We have a happy dog! (subject-verb-object)



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(simple and complex sentences of at least 6 words)

The cat ate all her food! (subject-verb-object)

I will pour food in her bowl. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Where did you put the cat food? (interrogative)

The cat food is in the cabinet. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

I asked, "Can you open the bag?" (direct discourse)

Let's use a cup to scoop it. (one clause + an infinitive)

I spilled some food on the floor. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Dad picked up the food for me. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

She is eating because she is hungry. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Mom said, "Her water bowl is empty." (direct discourse)

Can you help me get more water? (interrogative)

I can't reach the sink by myself. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

My mom got me a stool. (subject-verb-object)

Fill the cup and then pour it. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I don't want to make a mess. (one clause + an infinitive)

I dropped the cup on the floor! (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

I spilled water and I spilled food. (two clauses + a conjunction)

We can wipe it with a towel. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

My cat is drinking the water. (subject-verb-object)

She wants to take a nap. (one clause + an infinitive)

She is sleeping under the table. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)



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(complex sentences of at least 8 words containing 2 verb forms)

Our dog ate his food, so he needs more. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Did you get more dog food from the store? (interrogative)

Mom said, "Yes, it is in the car." (direct discourse)

My dog is sad because he is very hungry. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I need you to help me open the bag. (one clause + an infinitive)

I want to scoop the food with a cup. (one clause + an infinitive).

I don't like to smell the dog food. (one clause + an infinitive)

He is eating while I am pouring the food! (two clauses + a conjunction)

Some fell on the floor when I poured it. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Mom told me that I should get the broom. (indirect discourse)

We need to fill up the water bowl too. (one clause + an infinitive)

I asked mom, "Can you help me get water?" (direct discourse)

Mom told me to fill a cup with water. (indirect discourse)

I had to fill up the cup three times. (one clause + an infinitive)

Will you please turn on the faucet for me? (interrogative)

If I spill the water, it will be slippery. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I can't move because my dog is too big. (two clauses + a conjunction).

When he's finished eating, I will pour the water. (two clauses + a conjunction)

His belly is full so now we can play! (two clauses + a conjunction)



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(very complex sentences of at least 10 words containing 3 verb forms)

The dog ate all his food so we need to get him more. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

I asked mom if she got more food because the bag is empty. (indirect discourse)

Mom said, "I got more food when I went to the store." (direct discourse)

My dog is laying down and he looks sad so he must be hungry. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Will you help me open the bag since my scissors aren't sharp enough? (interrogative)

I want a cup to scoop the food, so my hands don't get dirty. (two clauses + a secondary verb).

My dog is trying to eat the food while I am pouring it! (two clauses + a secondary verb)

I need a broom because some food fell when I poured it. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Mom told me I don't need a broom because the dog will eat it. (indirect discourse)

The water bowl is almost empty, so we need to fill that too. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Should I take the bowl to the sink or use a cup? (interrogative)

Mom said, "The bowl will get heavy so you should use a cup." (direct discourse)

The cup is little so I will have to fill it many times. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

I want to use the bathroom sink because I can reach it better. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

If I spill water, it will be slippery so I should be careful. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

I tried to pour water in the bowl but my dog was in the way. (two clauses + a secondary verb).

I asked him if he could scoot over but he didn't move. (indirect discourse)

I will have to wait until he is finished eating. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

My dog ate his food and drank water, so he is happy now. (three clauses + two conjunctions)



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
